"NEWS YOU SHOULD USE" 100ABCWOMEN HONOUREE RECEIVES CARIBBEAN TOURISM ORGANIZATION (CTO) LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The Barbados-based Caribbean Tourism Organization (CTO) announced that it will honour Trinidad and Tobago-born storyteller and Canadian 'icon' Dr. Rita Cox, with its Lifetime Achievement Award on August 22, during the CTO Media Day luncheon. A Librarian by profession, she is a "renowned storyteller and an admired leader in the community", the CTO noted.

She joined the Toronto public library as a Children's Librarian in 1960 and in 1972, became the head of the Parkdale branch, where she launched literacy programmes and other initiatives that promoted multiculturalism throughout Toronto. During her tenure, she pioneered the library's "Black Heritage and West Indian Resource Collection", which was renamed in 1998 to the "Black and Caribbean Heritage Collection". It soon became one of the most comprehensive collections of its kind in Canada and today, continues to be a source of pride for the community.

"The Caribbean Tourism Organization appreciates Rita Cox's passion for promoting Caribbean heritage, through the collection she developed for the Toronto Public Library, as well as her storytelling events that pass our history on to the next generation," said Sylma Brown, Director of CTO-USA. "Her commitment to preserving Caribbean culture and dedication to keeping the region at the forefront of Canadian society, over decades, is the reason we are honouring her with the Lifetime Achievement Award," Brown added.

After her retirement from the Toronto Public Library in1995, Cox was appointed a Citizen Court Judge by the Government of Canada. She won numerous awards, including the Canadian Library Association's Public Service Award and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the African Canadian Achievement Awards.

In 1997, she was appointed a Member of the Order of Canada for her outstanding work in storytelling and literacy. Wilfrid Laurier and York Universities have awarded her Honorary Doctorate Degrees.

Three of our 100 ABC Honourees accepted invitations to participate at a conference - MY LABOUR OUR FUTURE- which was organized by the Atkinson Foundation and held in Montreal, Quebec, on August 14 to 16, 2019. The Atkinson Foundation is a Canadian charitable foundation that has been fighting for and supporting efforts to modernize Employment Standards and Labour Relations for more than 75 years. It also spans four generations in the "decent" work movement, reflects Canada's diversity and is a collective voice for its future. Here is some information about the ABC Honourees who participated:



ZANANA AKANDE, former MPP, was elected to the Ontario Legislator in 1990. When she was appointed as Minister of Community and Social Services, she became the first Black woman to hold a Cabinet position in Ontario. A New Democratic Minister of the Legislative Assembly from 1990 to 1994, she represented the downtown riding of St. Andrew-St. Patrick. After leaving politics, Zanana served as President of the Urban Alliance on

Race Relations, Canadian Alliance of Black Educators and Toronto Child Abuse Centre. She has been the recipient of many Awards and Medals, being recognized for her commitment to education and community.



JANICE GAIREY's history is entrenched in working with the communities of colour and comes from her father, the late Desmond Davis, who was a pivotal member of the Black Sleeping Car Porters, together with Stan Grizzle and the late Harry Gairey. Janice has amassed over fifty years as a social justice advocate. She started her career as an Educational Assistant and quickly moved up in her union's ranks, becoming Vice-President of CUPERTINO 1874. She worked with sever-

al unions and the Ontario Federation of Labour, where she served as the Human Rights Director from 2007 until she retired. Janice continues her organizing work today with the African-Canadian Legal Clinic and Black Lives Matter. She also serves on the Executive of the Congress of Union Retirees of Canada.



DR. LYNN JONES is a proud African-Canadian born and raised in Truro, Nova Scotia. Her roots span several generations, making her one of several indigenous African Nova Scotians. She was a Federal Public Service employee for over 30 years and has extensive experience in the Labour Movement: this includes being the first Black General Vice-President of the Canadian Labour Congress (CLC) and National Vice-President of the Canada Employment and Immigration Union. One of

Lynn's areas of concern has been environmental racism. In 1995, as Vice-President of CLC, she pushed for a chapter on this crucial topic in the first and only National anti-racism report of unions and their communities in Canada. Lynn recently donated over 50 years of personal archival material on the Black, local, national and international community to the St. Mary's University Library and Archives where it is now housed as the Lynn Jones African Canadian Diaspora Heritage Collection. In 2016, Lynn was recognized with an Honourary Doctorate from Arcadia University.

SOY-MAPLE GLAZED SALMON

INGREDIENTS

4 (6-7 oz) Salmon fillets 1/3 cup pure maple syrup 3 tbsp soy sauce 2 gloves garlic minced Freshly ground pepper (optional) Chopped green onions (optional) Salt (optional) remember soy sauce is salty

INSTRUCTIONS

- Whisk together, maple syrup, soy sauce and garlic in a bowl.
- Place salmon into a baking dish. Pour maple syrup mixture evenly over the salmon. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes, carefully rotating salmon once halfway through.
- Preheat oven to 400 degrees during the last 10 minutes of marinating the salmon.
- Transfer salmon onto a greased baking sheet. Do not discard any leftover marinade.
- Bake for 15 minutes or sooner, depending on the thickness of the salmon.
- While the salmon bakes, pour any leftover marinade into a sauce pan, simmer until mixture is heated
- When the salmon is done, drizzle the heated marinade on the salmon, add black pepper, chopped green onions and salt, if desired.

TIP: Serve with brown rice and steamed vegetables
