President Barack Obama at the Economic Club in Toronto





On January 23rd, 2020 The Economic Club of Canadian hosted Future of Work & New Economy Series: Part 1. Over six thousand persons attended the event that

featured U.S. president Barack Obama, as well as Mme. Sophie Gregoire Trudeau. Interestingly enough, however, when Mme Trudeau, gifted First Nations drummers and President Obama graced the stage...none of the intimacy between speaker and audience was lost. We felt a connection to them and what they shared with us. Each provided thoughtful, positive deposits into all in attendance. A lady at my table mentioned that she worked for the government. I casually asked if she was here as an agency representative, to which she responded, "the government doesn't know I'm here." Clearly this event was important enough to play adult hooky. Others agreed, as in a room of over six thousand, there were likely others at the event who had coughed on a call to their boss that morning.

All three 100 ABC Women co-authors were in attendance, as well as some of its core team, such as social media director Valerie Augustine, Event Planners Kares Clarke-Glasgow, Floydeen Charles-Fridal Huggins, Nicole Waldron and Joan Pierre, and this author, director of communications, Alyson Renaldo.

Sitting wherever you were in the filled Metro Convention Centre, one still cannot explain how large the space actually was...until you realized that even with 20/20 vision, jumbo screens were required in order to see the speakers. At one point this author considered sourcing hydration and packing a lunch to go speak to a colleague who was sitting on the other end of the venue. You may wonder what all the fuss is about. I mean we've all heard president Obama share insights before. One can Google his brilliance, so why trek downtown to see him during the work week? 100 ABC 2020 honouree and associate described hearing him speak as, "just inspiring. [President Obama] touched on so many things that I believe in."

The ostensible fuss was that President Obama's insights were connected to his continual commitment to learning and personal growth, which he seemed happy to share with all within the sound of his voice. In that regard, we were exposed to new points of wisdom, which resonated with us all and for that time connected each and every one of us.

100 ABC co-author Dauna Jones Simmonds described her attendance as being a defining moment, "I never thought it would happen. It was a historic moment for me. He was spot on with his answers, very inspiring...good motivation for the some five hundred young people in the room today."

100 ABC co-author Dr. Denise O'Neil Green observed that, "the president...I still call him 'president', as far as I'm concerned he is still my president. His responses were brilliant. He recognized the importance of young people and how their work will change the way we do business and how we treat the earth." Regarding the event itself, Dr. O'Neil Green lauds, "[It's] very impressive that this event was organized in six weeks. The organizers are to be commended."

Co-author the Honourable Dr. Jean Augustine was sought out by Rhiannon Rosalind, CEO of The Economic Club of Canada to increase attendance. Wait a minute-help fill The Metro Convention Centre in six weeks?! "Quite a feat," I asserted, "No, no, no," the honourable corrects me, "[I was asked to do so] in a few days. It was my pleasure to assist in bringing young people like yourself to this important event.

Young people...such as...myself. Well, there is irrefutable proof of the honourable Jean Augustine's generosity, as this author boasts regrets older than the actual young people in attendance. February is Black History Month



100 ABC spoke with one of our 2018 100 ABC honourees, Shannon Prince, curator of the *Buxton National Historic Site and Museum*, in North Buxton Ontario. We discussed the significance of Black History Month and taking a moment to learn something new about us, whenever possible. For instance, many of us have heard of the most famous conductor of *The Underground Railroad*,

Harriet Tubman. However, fewer of us are familiar with some of the people who 'disembarked' from that 'train' and how they had to rebuild their lives in yet another strange, rugged (and often frigid) new land.

The Underground Railroad was a secret network of freed and enslaved people during the 19th century which led enslaved Black people from United States to Canada while human ownership was still legal in the U.S. (Canada also has a history of slavery, however, it was abolished throughout the British Empire-to which Canada then belonged-some thirty years before the United States).

Much of the attention of one of the greatest civil rights movements in human history is often centred around the courageous journeys of people *heading* north, but less so upon their lives afterwards, which arguably required as much courage to create a life of freedom in yet another new world that did not have their success at the centre of its objectives. Towns such as Dresden, Chatham, Amhestburg and Buxton (formerly Elgin), were all founded by Black Pioneers.

Shannon Prince is sixth generation Black Canadian. 100 ABC asked her to provide us with a few lessor known Canadian Black History facts. Did you know that...

Canada's first Black doctor, Dr. Anderson Ruffin Abbott (educated in Buxton) became a surgeon during the US civil war and also practised medicine at the Freedman's Hospital in Washington...now Howard University

An art gallery in Chatham is featuring an exhibit entitled: *Legends Are The Rivers That Take Us Home*, which features a 30-minute film about Black pioneered towns of southern Ontario. Shannon Prince will be speaking there

Tony Dungy, whose roots are in Dresden ON became the first Black coach to win the Super Bowl in 2007

Maidstone, Saskatchewan is home to the province's first Black farming community, the Shiloh people, who settled there around 1910. The log church, the only remaining structure of the community was made into a provincial historical site in 2018

Shannon Prince explains that, "Celebrating Black History Month [a federal bill put forth by 100 ABC's very own Jean Augustine], allows us to pause, reflect, honour and remember all of the Black Canadian stories, so we can commemorate their achievements. It also creates awareness [so] we should feel inspired by their legacies...we are all standing on the shoulders of giants!"

Yes, agreed. Additionally, as history is made everyday, some of those 'giants' come in the form of a five foot tall woman, farming and actively preserving our legacy by curating a space like the Buxton Historical Site and Museum: a monument available to us, anytime we wish to connect with that part of our history. Thanks Shannon!

Happy Black History Month from 100 ABC...let's keep learning...throughout the year.
