SHE KNOWS, SHE TELLS YOU HERE...



Dr. Denise O'Neil Green, Co-Author of 100 Accomplished Black Women 2016, 2018 and 2020 (in process) and also Ryerson University's first Vice-President, Equity and Community Inclusion (OVPECI) lends a voice to the following article on Racism. The information represents a basic framework triggered by recent events in the United States. The article by no means exhausts the total story that unfolded but the protests that ensued spilled over into Canada which was portrayed under the heading as "Breaking News" on most TV news programmes. Dr. Green was invited to participate in developing this article on this very topical subject-Racism.

RACISM: a belief in the superiority of one group of people over another e.g. White Supremacy or White Supremacism is the racist belief that white people are superior to people of other races/colour and therefore should be dominant over them. Dr. O'Neil Green lived in an area that gave her the experience.....she didn't have to read about it. Authenticity and honesty came with her responses.

ANTI-RACISM: includes beliefs and actions developed to oppose RACISM on ideology, rejecting RACISM

DISCRIMINATION: an action or decision that treats a person or group badly for reasons such as race, age, colour, disability and more.

CAN RACISM BE ERADICATED? Yes! It will take time, hard work, education which includes training at all levels, discipline and very effective and efficient organizational skills.

SHOULD RACISM BE TAUGHT IN SCHOOLS? Yes! The topic belongs in the classroom, as well as at home. Children do notice differences ...so introducing the topic to them before it is presented by them will be easier. It has been said that if children do not see themselves or others looking like their parents around, they are apt to ask questions. Without the information they are missing a phenomenal part of who they are, which could eventually contribute to racism. Figuring out, when, where and how to begin the conversations about racial identity can be overwhelming, especially when making it part of the curriculum or part of everyday chats. The responsibility should outweigh the fear or awkwardness to do the "talk".

Listening to Dr. O'Neil Green was very interesting, in that experiencing racism vary in different places. In some areas, it is labeled systemic racism and it can be quite blatant. In other places it is hidden so deep in Society, it is either not recognized when it surfaces or it is known but denied. Recent events in the U.S.A. which sparked many days of protests brought racism to the surface in several countries around the world and protests were evident in every corner of the globe. These protests include every skin colour, all genders, all ages....it was amazing. Many people declared that for the first time they felt HOPE which for them it spelt CHANGE FOR GOOD.

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
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Minding My Business Series

THE JEAN AUGUSTINE CHAIR IN EDUCATION, COMMUNITY AND DIASPORA



During the past weeks there have been much voices raised in protest locally, nationally and globally with systemic racism at the centre. However, we know that many positive and beneficial activities are happening. What comes to mind is THE JEAN AUGUSTINE CHAIR IN EDUCATION, COMMUNITY AND DIASPORA at York University. This university Chair, established through the donation of the Hon. Jean Augustine archival materials to York University. It was first launched in the Faculty of Education in 2008. The aim is to advance access, equity and inclusivity to education through community engagement. The chair holder would initiate, facilitate, direct and engage in research, educational programmes and community partnerships.

Speaking to the current Chair Holder, Dr. Carl E. James, gave some insights. He is

Professor in the Faculty of Education and holds cross-appointments in the Graduate Programmes in Sociology, Social and Political Thought and Social Work. He is also the university's Affirmative Action, Equity and Inclusivity Officer and was the Director of the York Centre on Education & Community (2008-2016) which he founded. As well, he was Director of the Graduate Programme in Sociology (2007-2008). For 17 years, he was Course Director in the Teacher Training Department at Uppsala University, Sweden.

Dr. Carl James brings to the table not just his qualification, but research contributions on the education and employment experiences and achievements of Black people, and young people in particular. Through his work in social equity and anti-racism, James promotes having culturally relevant institutional policies, programs and practices that ensure that Black Canadians gain the educational background, employment opportunities, workplace ranking, and social outcomes that make for successful lives in Canada.

GLAZED FRESH PEACH PIE

INGREDIENTS

1 pie shell (9-inch, blind baked)

3/4 cup sugar

3 tablespoons cornstarch

1 can (12 oz) peach nectar

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

1 teaspoon lemon zest

3 lbs. firm ripe peaches, peeled, thickly sliced and chilled

DIRECTIONS

Line the pie crust with foil, pressing it over the bottom and up the sides of the pan. Add pie weights to the lined crust.

Bake pie crust in a preheated oven at 400 F for 15 mins. Remove the pie weights and foil and reduce the oven temperature to 375 F.

Prick the pie crust in several places with a fork and bake for an additional 10 to 15 mins, or until the crust is golden brown.

Remove the pie crust to a rack to cool.

In a saucepan, combine sugar and cornstarch and cook over medium heat.

Gradually add peach nectar, lemon juice and lemon peel

Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until the sugar and cornstarch dissolve.

When the mixture has thickened, remove from heat and let cool.

After the mixture gets close to room temperature, refrigerate the mixture to chill thoroughly.

Arrange half of the sliced peaches in the baked and cooled pie shell. Pour half of the chilled glaze over the peaches. Repeat with remaining peaches and glaze.

Chill the peach pie for at least 2 hours.

Serve alone or topped with a scoop of vanilla or peach ice cream.

(TIP.....If a frozen crust is being used, follow the package instructions for blind baking)
